On behalf of the Executive Committee, I submit for your adoption the 119th Annual Report of the Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club covering activities for the year ended 30 June 2026.

Highlights of the year include:

- Two Club members Noah Papandreas and Bronte White reach the finals in the Illawarra Male and Female Junior Lifesaver of the Year Awards.
- We commenced a program to acquire new beach safety equipment to expand our patrol abilities, with a UAV (drone) to assist with identifying sharks, and hopefully next season a jet ski that will facilitate prompt assistance to a swimmer in difficulties. Five members are now trained to operate the UAV, three members to operate a jet ski, and with further training programs planned, we expect to have additional members qualified before the start of the 2026-27 season.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with great pride that I present my final President's Report for the 2025–2026 season, another outstanding chapter in the proud 119-year history of the Helensburgh–Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club.

At the heart of everything we do is our commitment to keeping our community safe. This season our volunteer members once again demonstrated exceptional professionalism, providing more than 3,600 patrol hours, performing 14 rescues, over 615 preventative actions and numerous significant first aid responses. Most importantly, every person who visited Stanwell Park Beach had the opportunity to return home safely - testament to the dedication, skill and commitment of our patrol members and support teams.

While surf lifesaving remains our core purpose, our clubhouse has continued to grow as one of the true community hubs of the 2508 postcode. Throughout the year it has been wonderful to see members, families and local residents come together for Friday evening drinks, State of Origin and Socceroos broadcasts, weddings, 21st birthdays, family celebrations and countless other community events. Our clubhouse is far more than a patrol base - it is a place where friendships are formed, milestones celebrated and our community comes together.

The future of our club is incredibly bright. Our education and training programs continue to produce highly skilled lifesavers, with 15 members achieving their Surf Rescue Certificate, eight gaining their Bronze Medallion and further members qualifying in IRB operations, Rescue Water Craft and UAV operations. Our trainers, assessors and mentors deserve enormous credit for investing their time and expertise into developing the next generation of volunteers.

Our Junior Activities program again flourished with more than 200 Nippers participating throughout the season. Watching our young members grow in confidence, leadership and surf skills has been one of the highlights of the year. Congratulations to Bronte White and Noah Papandreas on reaching the finals of the Illawarra Junior Lifesaver of the Year Awards, and to every junior and senior competitor who proudly represented our club throughout the season.

Across every aspect of the club - from lifesaving, training and competition through to fundraising,

maintenance, administration and behind-the-scenes support—our volunteers have once again demonstrated what makes this club so special. Every patrol, every event and every success is built on the willingness of ordinary people to give their time for the benefit of others.

This season also reminded us of the strength of our club family as we farewelled several respected members whose contributions helped shape Helensburgh–Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club over many decades. Their legacy lives on through the values of service, friendship and community that continue to define our club today.

MISSION, OBJECTIVES, AND COMMITMENT TO CHILD SAFE

OUR MISSION:

To save lives by providing a safe beach and surfing area at Stanwell Park for community enjoyment, attended by our volunteer surf lifesavers on Sundays and public holidays between end-September and end-April.

Our focus as a surf life saving club is to work with and for our members and the local community, ultimately creating a thriving club, with pro-active members and a supportive community.

OUR OBJECTIVES

The Objects of the Club (as stated in the Constitution) are to:

- (a) Provide for the conduct, encouragement, promotion and administration of surf lifesaving;
- (b) Participate as a Member of Surf Life Saving Illawarra, Surf Life Saving New South Wales and Surf Life Saving Australia through and by which surf lifesaving and the preservation of life in the aquatic environment can be conducted, encouraged, promoted, advanced and administered;
- (c) At all times act on behalf of and in the interest of the Members and surf lifesaving;
- (d) Affiliate with and otherwise liaise with SLSI, SLSNSW and SLISA in the pursuit of these Objects and surf lifesaving;
- (e) Promote the involvement and influence of surf lifesaving standards, techniques, awards and education with bodies involved in lifesaving;
- (f) Prepare junior members for admittance as surf lifesavers;
- (g) Promote competition at Club and inter-club level for junior and senior members;
- (h) Review and/or determine any matters relating to surf lifesaving which may arise, or be referred to it, by any Member;
- (i) Pursue through itself or other such commercial arrangements (which are not in conflict with other SLS bodies), including sponsorship and marketing opportunities as are appropriate to further the interests of surf lifesaving;
- (j) Represent the interests of its Members and of surf lifesaving generally in any appropriate forum;
- (k) Have regard to the public interest in its operations;
- (l) Undertake and/or do all such things or activities which are necessary, incidental or conducive to the advancement of these Objects.

OUR COMMITMENT TO CHILD SAFE

The Executive Committee at its meeting on 13.11.2023 fully endorsed and adopted the Child Safe Commitment template developed by Surf Life Saving Australia as a statement by the Club as to how it will manage and promote child safe practices.

SLS Illawarra Junior Lifesaver of the Year Awards

All 17 Illawarra surf life saving clubs are invited annually to recognise the achievements of their U/14 Junior Activity Members in surf life saving by nominating a male member and a female member for consideration as the SLS Illawarra Junior Life Savers of the Year. This season, Noah Papandreas and Bronte White were nominated and reached the finalist stage of the award.

Noah's highlights included completing his SRC and going on patrol, and competing in the 2km at State where he came 4th and Aussies where he came 6th.

Noah enjoyed volunteering with Disabled Surfers South Coast and his initiative for JLOTY was for

local clubs to join together to hold an All-Abilities Day to allow kids with disabilities to enjoy Nippers and the ocean.

Bronte's proudest moment in Surf Life Saving was completing her SRC, receiving her first patrol uniform and starting her first patrol. Bronte emphasised that ever since joining nippers as an U6 member, she had always wanted to be on patrol and gain her Bronze Medallion. She is proud to have made it this far and can see all her hard work over the years has paid off.

Bronte noted that Surf Club has enabled her to make new friends and give back to the community in a great way, knowing that what she learns now could help save someone in the future.

Awards of Excellence

Our annual Awards of Excellence and Presentation Night was held on Saturday 9 May 2026 to recognise and acknowledge members who had contributed to the success of the Club during the 2025-26 season. Nominees came from all sections of the Club and included patrol members, age managers, trainers and assessors and competitors, and behind-the-scenes members who manage membership registrations, maintenance of lifesaving and first aid equipment, cleaning the building and many other tasks.

Once again the Awards Night was combined with Patrol Members Dinner, with over 50 Club members and partners attending.

A total of 19 Awards of Excellence were presented as noted below, with the winners of 13 awards subsequently nominated for consideration at the SLS Illawarra Awards of Excellence. Unfortunately our members did not win any SLSI Awards this year.

Patrol Member (Lifesaver) of the Year: Karl Weber

Criteria: an active patrolling member who has made an outstanding contribution to the delivery and development of surf life saving frontline services.

Karl was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Surf Lifesaver of the Year.

Patrol Member (Lifesaver) of the Year: Highly Commended - Erin Blackwell

Criteria: an active patrolling member who has made an outstanding contribution to the delivery and development of surf life saving frontline services.

Young Lifesaver of the Year: Brodie Pittman

Criteria: an active patrolling member (15-21 years) who has made an outstanding contribution to the delivery and development of surf lifesaving frontline services.

Brodie was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Youth Lifesaver of the Year.

Club Member of the Year: Geoff Ryder

Criteria: a member who has made a difference through their volunteering efforts.

Geoff was nominated for the equivalent SLS Illawarra award of Volunteer of the Year.

Young Volunteer of the Year: Julian Mithieux

Criteria: a member (15-21 years) who has made a difference through their volunteering efforts.

Julian was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Young Volunteer of the Year.

Young Volunteer of the Year: Highly Commended - Ivy Heffernan

Criteria: a young member (15-21 years) who has made a difference through their volunteering efforts.

Patrol Captain of the Year: Karl Weber

Criteria: a Patrol Captain who is passionate about improving the service their patrol offers to the community, or the experience it offers to members.

Karl was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Patrol Captain of the Year.

Assessor of the Year: Geoff Ryder

Criteria: an endorsed Assessor who is passionate about building the skills of others, consistently delivers a positive learning experience, and who encourages other members to engage in the delivery of training. Geoff was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Assessor of the Year.

Trainer of the Year: Lauren Ami MacDonald

Criteria: an endorsed Trainer who is passionate about building the skills of others, consistently delivers a positive learning experience, and who encourages other members to engage in the delivery of training.

Lauren was nominated for the SLSI award of Trainer of the Year.

Surf Sports Official of the Year: Robert White

Criteria: an accredited Surf Sports Official who has made a significant contribution to both officiating at a state, national and/or international level, and to the educational development of other officials in Surf Life Saving.

Administrator of the Year: Christine McDonald

Criteria: an Administrator who consistently goes the extra mile to make the lives of other members easier, or to make the services and programs delivered by the Club run smoother.
Christine was nominated for the SLSI award of Administrator of the Year.

Athlete of the Year: Ryan Andrews

Criteria: an athlete aged 15 years or older who has achieved sporting excellence in Open Aged Competition.

Ryan was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Athlete of the Year

Masters Athlete of the Year: Todd Andrews

Criteria: an athlete over the age of 30 years who has achieved sporting excellence.

Todd was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Masters Athlete of the Year.

Junior Athlete of the Year: Noah Papandreas

Criteria: an athlete up to the age of 14 years who has achieved sporting excellence in Junior Competition

Noah was nominated for the SLS Illawarra award of Junior Athlete of the Year.

Junior Activities Volunteer of the Year: Paula McLarnon

Criteria: an impressive member who has made a difference in our Junior Activities program throughout the season.

Paula was nominated for the SLSI award of Junior Activities Volunteer of the Year.

Club Patrol Efficiency Competition: Winning Patrol No 2.

Patrol members: Karl Weber (Captain), Russ Taunton (Vice Captain), Codie Weber, Matthew Anger, Aidan Giusti, Julian Mithieux, Kaden Taunton, Kailen Waite, Darcy Weber, Isabella Ashley, Sian Jenkins and Bronte White.

This is solely a Club award with no equivalent SLS Illawarra award.

Surf Sports Team of the Year: Sea Eels Winter Swimming Club members.

Criteria: a team in an event contested by more than one competitor from the same club or lifesaving unit, such as a boat race, IRB race, surf teams, or separately as in relay events, etc.

Awarded to the Sea Eels team for awards won at the Australian Winter Swimming Championships.

As this is not an SLSA event, a nomination for an SLS Illawarra award was not pursued.

Innovation of the Year: Christine McDonald and Justin Larkin.

Criteria: A well-researched concept, piece of equipment, program or event which is/has been implemented to improve any facet of Surf Life Saving. This category is no longer included as an SLS Illawarra or SLSNSW award.

Awarded in recognition of their successful efforts to re-introduce Club Senior Point Score and Championships events.

Services Team of the Year: IRB Team

Criteria: An outstanding team who has made a positive impact in Surf Life Saving or the community through their volunteer services.

Awarded in recognition of the IRB team's commitment to upskilling members as IRB drivers and crew persons and maintaining the IRBs, motors and other equipment.

A nomination for an SLS Illawarra award was not pursued.

SLSA Patrol Service Awards

Awarded to patrol members who have completed a minimum of 5 years patrol service with 100% patrol attendance and a minimum of 16 hours patrols each season.

Seven members received this award.

Among the awardees, Steven McDonald was acknowledged for his 40 years of service as a patrol member with 100% attendance.

LIFESAVING AND PATROLS

Club Captains Report

As we look back on the 2025-26 season, I am struck by the sheer resilience and professionalism of our six patrols.

Behind every hour recorded on the sand is a great team of lifesavers — individuals who are not only qualified but deeply committed to the safety of our beach.

You have acted as true leaders, helping to steer through a season that was as unpredictable as it was demanding.

Patrol Operations

Our 14 rescues this season were not routine pick-ups. In several cases, visitors were incredibly lucky to be saved when they were pulled from high-risk situations where the outcome could have been very different.

We officially recorded 615 preventative actions, but we all know the real number is far higher.

Every flag shifted, every swimmer warned, every sign erected is a preventative action. Our presence alone is a deterrent to danger.

Our clinical skills were also put to the test with eight significant first aid responses, handled with the composure and care that HSPSLSC is known for.

Nippers and Junior Activities

A major part of our success this season was the essential effort of the Nippers water safety team.

Their presence in the water every Sunday ensures our future lifesavers can develop their skills in a safe and supportive environment.

Without this team, our Junior Activities program simply could not function.

Membership and new qualifications

This season we continued to grow, welcoming:

- 15 new SRC members spread across our patrols
- 8 new Bronze Medallion holders
- 3 new RWC drivers, 3 new IRB drivers, and 5 new Drone pilots

To our new members: though you are beginning to develop your skills and qualifications, you are already leaders within your community. Your energy and willingness to learn are the lifeblood of this club.

Season Challenges

Season 2025-26 wasn't an easy run. We navigated numerous shark alerts, shifting patrol hours, and a challenging situation regarding our patrol agreement. We shared the water with whales, stingrays, and seals, and sometimes fought an influx of bluebottles.

As for club resources: broken ATVs and IRB motors, flat trailer tyres, and getting bogged in the sand more times than we'd like to admit.

Thanks to our in-club and external maintenance team, and to Helensburgh Tyres for their support.

Special Mention

Special mention to Julian Mithieux, who completed 104 hours across the season including his rostered hours, over 20 as a substitute, and 48 hours as a volunteer. An outstanding contribution.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

Chief Training Officer's Report

Overview

This season has been defined by significant growth and the successful integration of new lifesavers into our patrolling ranks. Our focus remained on bridging the gap between junior ranks and active patrolling members, ensuring the long-term sustainability of our frontline services.

Candidate Success and Transitions

1. The SRC Cohort (15 Candidates)

Our primary focus was the development of 15 Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) candidates. I am pleased to report a 100% success rate. These members have transitioned from the training environment to active duty, providing vital fresh energy to our patrols.

2. The Bronze Medallion Pipeline (8 Candidates). We saw a strong commitment to upskilling across both youth and adult demographics:

- **SRC to Bronze (5 Candidates):** Five younger members stepped up, ensuring we retain experienced youth qualified for advanced rescue techniques.
- **Adult Bronze (3 Candidates):** Three new adult members attained their Bronze Medallion.
- **Impact:** These members bolster our core strength, performing roles across active patrols and water safety.

3. Powercraft Operations (3 IRB Drivers)

Expanding our technical rescue capability, three members successfully completed their Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) Driver training and graduation. Given the challenging surf conditions at Stanwell Park, increasing our pool of qualified

drivers is critical for rapid response and offshore rescues.

In late May / early June 2025, I decided to compete in the Surf Life Saving beach events at the 2025 World Masters Games in Taiwan. This is a sanctioned International Lifesaving Federation event with medals presented by the ILF President, Mr Graham Ford OAM.

I was really proud to represent Helensburgh-Stanwell Park SLSC at this event, and to be able to add to the Club's tally of medals won at international level:

- Beach Sprint - 1st (Gold Medal and World Champion)
- Beach Flags - 1st (Gold Medal and World Champion)
- Beach Run 1km - Third (Bronze Medal)

Whilst I have heard that Club members have participated in World Surf Life Saving Championships in the past, and won a Gold Medal on two occasions in the Beach Flags event, as well as a Bronze Medal in a beach relay, this is probably the first occasion where a H-SP Club member has competed in a World Championship (albeit World Masters Games) and won both the beach sprint and beach flags event

In Round 2 at Terrigal after returning to racing post injury, Lauren Ami MacDonald placed 2nd in finals for 35's Female Tube, 1st in 35's Rescue and 4th in 35's mass rescue. In classic Mithieux fashion, Julian hit his first season crewing strong,

placing 2nd in finals for Open Male Rescue and 1st in U23 Male Rescue.

Round 3 was cancelled due to unprecedented surf conditions at Queenscliffe, but with Round 4 around the corner, the team prepared to fight for the medals they were in contention for.

At the end of Round 4, held at Swansea Belmont, Lauren Ami MacDonald podiomed in all her Masters events as well as Open Relay, bringing home a silver medal in Tube, Rescue, Mass, and a bronze in Open Relay. As part of the relay team, Zazou Mackenzie and Ivy Heffernan also received a bronze medal. Julian Mithieux received a silver in Open Male Teams and U23 Male Teams, as well as a bronze in Open Relay.

With the help of these results, Thirroul placed 3rd in the overall club pointscore across the state. Though our Stanwell Park team did not have the numbers to compete under the club's name, our racers value the opportunity to join forces with Thirroul and learn new skills that cross-club relationships

COALCLIFF OCEAN SWIM CLUB

This year Coalcliff SLSC invited Helensburgh-Stanwell Park SLSC to become involved with the Coalcliff Ocean Swim Club, with the intention that some of the regular Sunday morning swims would be held at Stanwell Park followed by a social lunch.

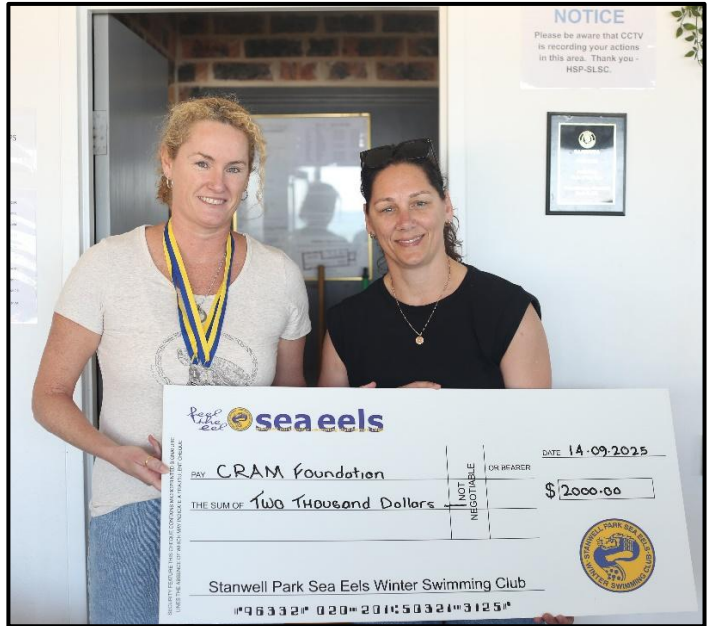

The Year in Review:

A surplus of \$5,427 was recorded for the 2024-2025 year after factoring in depreciation expenses of \$39,539.

Income: \$161,401 an increase of \$9,823 compared to the 2023-2024 year. Major variations were an increase in Government Grants with the \$30k grant for upgrading of the building access control and security system, and a reduction in sales income.

Expenditure: \$155,974 an increase of \$14,638 compared to the 2022-23 year. Major variations include a decrease in Cost of Sales, and increases in carnivals and competition expenses and repairs and maintenance.

Sales income of \$40,500 was \$16,835 less than the previous year, whilst cost of goods sold was \$13,284 less than the previous year.

Financial Position

At 31 March 2025, cash at bank (operating accounts) was \$55,546, compared to \$43,382 the previous year.

A contingency amount of \$22,000 was invested in a Term Deposit to cover damage to the club building up to \$20,000 for which the Club is liable under the terms of the building lease.

\$137,629 is invested in term deposits; \$100,000 of this is funds accrued over recent years for Club building improvements.

At 31 March 2025, the Club was not in debt to any supplier, other than within 30 day trading terms. At the date of this report 24.06.2025, this statement is still correct.

REVENUE FROM GOVERNMENT

During the year, all levels of Government provided financial support to assist our surf life saving operations. Total income received was \$18,125 as follows:

- \$10,000 Australian Government 2025-26 Beach Safety Equipment Fund Grant.
- \$2,000 Australian Government 2024-25 Volunteer Grant.
- \$2,325 NSW Government 2025-26 Lifesaving Equipment Grant.
- \$3,243 Wollongong City Council 2025-26 Lifesaving Agreement Funding

Australian Government – BSEF

This \$10,000 grant was expended on part cost of a new IRB hull, which has enabled the retirement and disposal of a 12 year old IRB hull known as the 2508.

Australian Government – Volunteer Grants Program

\$2,000 was received through the Australian Department of Social Services 2024-25 Volunteer Grants Program, and applied towards the purchase a large screen television to improve delivery of theory training sessions for candidates completing the Surf Rescue Certificate course, the Bronze Medallion course, UAV drone operator course, and other SLSA training courses.

The TV has facilitated the retirement of an older overhead projector and roll down screen, and provides for a single connection between laptop and TV, with a very clear colour picture.

The TV will also be useful to display information at both community and fund raising events.

Our thanks to our local MP Alison Byrnes, Member for Cunningham for her support of our application to buy a TV and including our request in the Cunningham Electorate funding allocation.

New South Wales Government - CLEG Funding

The 2025-26 Lifesaving Equipment Grant of \$2,325 provided through the Emergency Services Portfolio to all NSW surf life saving clubs was applied to the acquisition of a UAV (drone) this year.

This will enable aerial surveillance of the surf and beach during rostered patrol hours. With five current trained operators and other members interested in completing the course, the UAV will be a useful tool for spotting sharks who come near to the flagged area and other areas where swimmers are in the water.

Our thanks are extended to the NSW Government and our State member for Heathcote, Maryanne Stuart, for supporting the CLEG funding for surf clubs again this season.

Wollongong City Council Lifesaving Agreement Funding

Wollongong City Council again provided a grant as part of the Lifesaving Agreement Program, with \$3,243 received. These funds were applied towards operational costs of providing rostered patrols on Sundays and public holidays

Summary of income from our donors and sponsors - to each we extend our thanks for your**Donations:**

- \$10,000 Robert Brunton Legacy, to be expended over 10+ years on development of Junior Activity members to become future surf lifesavers. \$660 was expended in 2024-25 to present an SLISA kit bag to each of the U14 Junior Activity members who graduated as Cadets and commenced rostered patrols, with a similar kit bag presented this year to 15 x 13 year old members who graduated as Cadets at a cost of \$792. The balance of this donation - \$8,548 was accrued for continued development of our younger members in future years.
- \$10,000 Anger Family Legacy, to be expended over 10+ years on development of Junior Activity members to become future surf lifesavers. \$340 of this funding was applied towards the 2024-25 Leadership Development Camp attended by our 12 and 13 year old members as they transition to become Cadet surf lifesavers.

This season \$933 was expended on providing tee shirts and meals for 21 members attending the 2025-26 Development Camp. The balance of this donation - \$8,727 was accrued for continued development of our younger members.
- \$8,000 Surf Life Saving NSW annual compliance funding. \$5,000 of this donation is earmarked towards rescue equipment and beach patrols, and the remaining \$3,000 is yet to be determined.
- \$5,000 Peabody Energy (Metropolitan Collieries). The \$5,000 donation was used towards purchase of a Thundercat IRB hull.
- \$1,000 Bondi Icebergs, as a donation to Winter Swimmers and applied to fundraising for the charity which they support, CRAM Foundation.
- \$789 Surf Life Saving Australia, patrol uniform subsidy applied towards the purchase of rash vests for patrol members.
- \$594 Surf Life Saving NSW, donation to assist in upgrading of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training equipment.
- \$200 Surf Life Saving NSW, to cover the cost of re-programming portable radios to new frequencies.
- \$120 Helensburgh Tyres, used towards maintenance of Club equipment.

The Association's Charitable Purpose as a surf life saving club falls within the ACNC Charitable Purpose of "Advancing the security or safety of Australia or the Australian public" as an organisation that offers volunteer emergency or safety services.

The Association:

- is the holder of an authority to fundraise in NSW under Section 13A of the *Charitable Fundraising Act* (NSW) 1991, Authority Number CFN/26993 valid to 18.03.2027.
- has been endorsed since 01.07.2000 as a Deductible Gift Recipient under the provisions of Sub-Division 30-B of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* (Cth) 1997
- has been registered since 01.07.2000 with the Australian Taxation Office for GST.
- has been endorsed by the Australian Taxation Office to access the following tax concessions:
 - Income Tax Exemption from 01.07.2000 under Sub-Division 50-B of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* (Cth) 1997
 - GST concessions from 01.07.2005 under Division 176 of *A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act* (Cth) 1999
 - FBT Exemption from 01.07.2005 under Section 123C of the *Fringe Benefits Tax Assessment Act* (Cth) 1986

Charitable Fundraising Act (NSW) 1991. Further as required by the Act, the Association is required to complete and submit a Financial Report each year to NSW Fair Trading, together with a signed declaration of compliance with the Act. The declaration is included in the Financial Statements.

GST reporting

Business Activity Statements were submitted to the Australian Taxation Office at the end of each quarter, the last Statement being submitted for quarter ending 31.03.2026.

Insurance

Surf Life Saving Australia arranges through Marsh Australia, insurance for surf life saving clubs throughout Australia. The insurance proposal for 2025-26 was completed and submitted on 18.08.2025, for policies covering loss or damage to assets valid to 01.10.2026, Public Liability Insurance (\$50 million) valid to 07.10.2026, and Directors and Officers Insurance valid to 01.10.2026.

Child Safe and Working with Children Check

The Executive Committee continues to ensure Club officers and members who, as part of their Club activities become associated with members under the age of 18 years, have a current Working with Children clearance to comply with the *Child Protection (Working with Children) Act* 2012, and *Child Protection (Working with Children) Regulation*, 2013.

Club policy requires all Junior Activity Committee Members and Age Managers to complete a WWC check. As at 20.06.2026, 47 Club officers were recorded with a current WWCC clearance.

Liquor Licence

The Club holds On-Premises Liquor Licence (LIQO 660031060) for Stanwell Park Surf Club, with Harley Dreghorn the appointed Licence Manager.

In accordance with the Licence Conditions, the Club continues to be a member of the Wollongong LGA Liquor Accord, with the Licence Manager attending quarterly meetings.

The Club's Venue Management Plan was updated during the year to incorporate the use of CCTV cameras in the main hall and bar area.

CLUB BUILDING

Club building - Wollongong City Council support

Similar to previous years, Council arranged regular checks of emergency lighting, smoke detectors, fire extinguishers and electrical distribution boards during the year. Council also repaired latches on the windows of the main hall, and attended to minor plumbing and electrical problems reported during the year.

Early in 2026, Council replaced two of the three roller doors. Once council approval is received, an electric motor will be fitted to the western roller door similar to the centre door, with the cost of this work funded by the Surf Club.

Water leaks entering the main hall beneath the floor to ceiling windows, near the patrol room door, are still occurring with heavy rain. Council staff have further investigated the problem and applied temporary repairs, but to date have not been able to fully resolve the problem.

Cleaning and Maintenance

Interior cleaning of the main hall and amenities continues to be undertaken on a weekly basis by members of the Sea Eels for a nominal fee paid to the Sea Eels as a donation towards their main charity CRAM Foundation. Sea Eels on-going commitment to clean the hall is appreciated.

In accordance with the lease agreement with WCC, the Surf Club is responsible for minor repairs and maintenance within the building. Much of this work is undertaken by Peter McDonald as Building Maintenance Officer.

Access Control System & CCTV cameras

Geoff Ryder and Chris Ryder (from Douglas Ryder and Co) continue to maintain and service the access control system, and deal with requests for coding of fobs and if required, retrieval of CCTV footage. No requests have been received since the system was activated in late 2024.

Cleaning and presentation of Bar and Kitchen Servery walls.

Following on from a suggestion from Peter McDonald, the feasibility of installing ceramic tiles to the painted wall beneath the Bar and Kitchen serveries to facilitate cleaning and overall presentation has been investigated.

Whilst feasible and an indicative cost has been obtained from a wall tiler, the type (shape and

size) and texture of wall tiles required to minimise damage from bumps and knocks as patrons queue at the counter, is unresolved at this stage.

Thanks to Michelle Viret for her guidance and assistance in suggesting suitable tiles. Once a decision is taken on tiles and final cost known, a decision will be made, following which Council approval to proceed will be obtained.

Acoustic insulation panels in main hall.

Three of the 30 acoustic panels installed in 2019 and attached to the ceiling with adhesive, have become detached, whilst other panels are showing similar signs of becoming detached.

Inquiries are in progress to ascertain a suitable adhesive product and then engage a building contractor to undertake the work.

“Making the Club Accessible” Project

The 2023-24 Annual Report noted that in December 2023 Wollongong City Council as building owner had given landowners consent to the Club lodging a Development Application.

Further before a DA can be lodged, some of the reports which had previously been obtained and which will form part of the DA, had lapsed and needed to be updated and amended to meet changes to planning rules.

There has been no progress over the past 12 months due in part to unavailability of our architect. Brett Sherson. The Executive Committee will advise members of any developments as soon as they occur.

Hire of Surf Club

The Surf Club continues to be made available for community use with regular dance and yoga classes, and table tennis. End-of month Friday night drinks were scheduled for the warmer months and attended by the local community, with local charitable organisations invited to provide and sell food to attendees, and local musicians invited to perform.

The premises are also hired for private functions including weddings and birthdays. The hire charge for private functions was reviewed and some minor increases introduced in January 2026 to cover cost increases incurred by the Club.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc is an Association incorporated in New South Wales in 1995 under the provisions of the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009. The Executive Committee is the governing body of the Association, with the following members elected at the Association's Annual General Meeting held on 06.07.2025 and continue to hold office at the date of this report:

On 09.09.2025, the Executive Committee appointed Stuart Brandman to fill the vacant position of Chairperson of the Junior Activities Committee. The incumbent of this position is a member of the Club Executive Committee, Stuart Brandman was duly appointed to the Executive Committee on the same date.

The Association registered as a charitable organisation with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission on 20.01.2013. The President, Secretary and Treasurer are registered with ACNC as the Responsible Persons for the Association.

The Association is a not-for-profit organisation operating as a surf life saving club and emergency service organisation in the Stanwell Park district.

1 Basis of preparation

The Executive Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity and this report has accordingly been prepared as a Special Purpose Financial Statement, covering all operations and activities of the Association as an individual entity for the 12 months ended 31 March 2026.

The Financial Statements were prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act* (Cth) 2012, as well as the *Charitable Fundraising Act* (NSW) 1991 and the Associations Incorporation Act (NSW) 2009 and associated Regulations, and also to meet the requirements of the members of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club Inc.

The Financial Statements were prepared in accordance with various Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and on an accruals basis, based on historical costs, modified where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Estimates and judgements included in these Financial Statements are based on the Association's actual income and expenditure over the past two years and other known factors as well as proposed activities and projected budgets for the forthcoming financial year.

The following accounting standards relevant to charitable organisations and not-for-profit entities, apply:

- AASB 13: Fair value of Leases
- AASB 15: Revenue from Contracts with Customers
- AASB 16: Leases
- AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements

The application of these Standards has not resulted in any material changes to the Association's financial position, performance, or cash flow.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue and other income

Other than as stated below, revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, and it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Association.

(b) Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised at the time of transfer of goods to the customer when the risks and rewards are transferred and the Association no longer has ownership or control.

(c) Private Functions and Community Events

The 5-step process noted in AASB 15 is applied with revenue from private functions and community events recognised at the conclusion of the event when the Association can identify it has met its contractual obligations of providing an agreed service to a customer.

(d) Membership and related fees

Revenue from membership fees and other membership charges are recognised at the time of receipt, other than fees or charges received in advance for a subsequent membership year when the revenue is carried forward on the Balance Sheet.

(e) Donations and Sponsorship

Revenue is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement when received, unless designated for a special purpose or is subject to conditions, in which case revenue is recognised as a liability and carried forward on the Balance Sheet until used for the designated purpose or the conditions have been met.

(f) Revenue from Government

Grant revenue is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement when the Association obtains control of the grant funds, it is probable that the economic benefits gained will flow to the Association and the grant can be measured reliably.

When a grant is subject to conditions such as a designated use, time frame for completion, and/or acquittal obligations, revenue is recognised as a liability and carried forward on the Balance Sheet until such time as the conditions have been met.

Grants received to acquire or renew plant and equipment assets on a \$ for \$ basis or a nominal amount, are recognised as an addition to plant and equipment values on the Balance Sheet at fair value equal to their usual selling price at the date of acquisition. When this occurs, a corresponding amount of income comprising either grant funding or a donation amount, is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement.

Grants received to undertake leasehold works to the Club building are recognised as income in the Income and Expenditure Statement with the cost of asset improvement works carried as a property asset on the Balance Sheet.

(g) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value, less where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

(h) Depreciation

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a reducing balance basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing from when the asset is first acquired.

Assets used for lifesaving, member training and development, and competition are depreciated at 20% over five years on a straight-line basis, whilst furniture, fittings and assets in use in the office, main hall, bar, kitchen and amenities, are depreciated at 15% over seven years on a straight-line basis.

The value of improvements to the leased premises occupied by the Association and completed in 2019, are depreciated at 15% over seven years on a straight-line basis.

All categories of plant and equipment acquired at a cost of less than \$3,000 are fully depreciated during the financial year of acquisition.

Assets acquired at a cost of less than \$1,000 are not capitalised and are included as an expense in the Income and Expenditure Statement.

The Executive Committee reviews the depreciation methodology, useful life criteria and residual value of assets annually and introduces adjustments as required.

(i) Leases

The Association leases the Surf Club premises at Stanwell Park from Wollongong City Council at a peppercorn rental with right-of-use to occupy the premises for the sole purpose of furthering its Objectives as a surf life saving club. The Association has no other leases in place either financial or operational.

The Executive Committee has considered the implications of AASB 16 - Leases, AASB 13 - Fair Value of Leases, and AASB 2018-8 - Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit entities in relation to the Association's occupation of the Club premises as a lessee.

After review of the accounting standards, the Executive Committee has determined:

- the building lease is not classified as an operating or finance lease,
- the lease grants right-of-use to the Association solely for surf life saving operations and activities,
- the lease provides significantly below-market terms and conditions, and
- the below-market terms and conditions are primarily allowed by the Lessor to enable the Association to further its Objectives as a surf life saving club.

The accounting standards allow not-for-profit entities having right-of-use of leased premises and where the terms and conditions are below-market, to elect to measure the value of a lease at its initial recognition at cost, subject to disclosure of additional qualitative and quantitative information about the lease.

The Association has therefore elected to adopt this measure, and provides the following information about the building lease:

- **Leased Premises:** Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Life Saving Club building
1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park, NSW 2508
- **Lessor:** Wollongong City Council
- **Right-of-Use:** The Association has exclusive rights to occupy and use the building for surf life saving operations and activities, other than the Council Lifeguards amenities room and equipment storage shed.
- **Lease start date:** 1 November 2018
- **Term of lease:** 21 years, expiring on 31 October 2039
- **Lease payments:** First year (2018-2019) - \$690.00 (incl GST) payable in advance.
Rental in subsequent years is varied annually according to Wollongong City Council's Community and Sporting Group annual rental charges.
- **Payments to date:** \$5,989 (incl GST) paid for the period 1 November 2018 to 31 October 2025.
- **Value of lease:** The total value of the lease is approximately \$15,790 (incl GST)
- **Lease conditions:** Summary (relevant conditions only).
The Premises may only be used for surf life saving operations and activities, including activities associated with raising funds to further the Objectives of the Association.
The Association as lessee is responsible for maintaining the interior of the Premises in good condition, and repairing any damage to the Premises up to a value of \$20,000.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

No amount has been allocated for Provisions in the reporting period

Comparative Figures

This report is for the 12 month period commencing 1 April 2025 and ending 31 March 2026, with comparative figures for the 12 months ended 31 March 2025.

Income Tax

The Association is an Exempt Entity as defined in Section 50-5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* (Cth), 1997, as a charitable organisation registered with Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission.

Goods and Services Tax

Transactions are recognised net of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO, is included with other receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

Building Fund Term Deposits

Funds held in Building Fund Term Deposits have been raised for and are allocated to future extensions and upgrading of the Club building.

Building Lease Contingency Fund

A condition of the lease of Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Club building from Wollongong City Council obligates the Association to make good at its cost minor damage up to an amount of \$20,000. The Association has accordingly set aside an amount of \$20,000 to meet this obligation should damage occur.

In accordance with AASB 137 – Provisions, the Association does not treat this as a Liability or Provision as there is no current obligation for an outflow of benefits as a result of a past event, the amount of any outflow of benefits cannot be reliably estimated, the timing of an event is unknown, and the probability is low.

Prepayments

Prepayments represent expenses paid by the Association for goods or services acquired during the reporting period intended for use in a subsequent reporting period, and are recognised as a financial asset.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables represent income due to the Association, but not received at the end of the reporting period. Receivables are recognised as a financial asset in the current reporting period

Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost is based on the first-in, first-out method and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to the existing condition and location.

Property, Plant and Equipment

(a) Land and Buildings

The Association does not own any real property.

The Association leases the surf club building at 1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park from Wollongong City Council with the lease expiring in 2039. Refer Note 2(i) for details about treatment of the value of the lease as an asset.

Leasehold improvements to the building completed during the 2019-20 year are depreciated annually on a straight-line basis over seven years as reported below.

The Association owns two shipping containers (with no residual asset value) used for storage of equipment, located on privately owned property at 225 Parkes Street, Helensburgh at nil rental under a reciprocal arrangement with the property owner

During the 2020-21 year, the Association initiated a project to upgrade the surf club building to current accessibility standards and engaged consultants to prepare a Development Application. Consultants fees were included in the Income and Expenditure Statement as this work has no direct impact on the current value of any land or buildings. Funds for payment of consultant's fees were drawn from the Building Fund.

(b) Plant and Equipment

Assets acquired at a cost of \$3,000 or more and used for lifesaving and beach patrols, member training and competition are depreciated annually based on their estimated useful life and service reliability, with depreciation calculated on a straight-line basis over five years. Furniture and fittings and all other assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over seven years.

Assets acquired with a value of less than \$3,000 are fully depreciated in the financial year of acquisition.

Trade Creditors

Trade Creditors represent a liability for goods and services included on a Purchase Order placed with a supplier during the reporting period, but unpaid at the end of the reporting period.

Other Current Payables

Other payables represent a liability for goods and services ordered or supplied during the reporting period, but unpaid at the end of the reporting period.

Related Party Transactions

Nil.

Key Management Personnel

Members including key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for their work.

Segment reporting

The Association provides surf life saving services to the community for the Stanwell Park district.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the services to customers.

Revenue from commissions is recognised upon delivery of services to customers.

Revenue from interest is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Revenue from dividends is recognised when the entity has a right to receive the dividend.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Leases

Finance leases are leases of fixed assets where substantially all of the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset are transferred to the entity, but the legal ownership is not transferred to the entity.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a corresponding liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased asset, or the minimum lease payments measured at present value including any residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Operating lease payments are charged to the income statement on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Lease incentives are deferred and amortised over the period of the lease.

Profits and losses on sale and leaseback transactions are recognised in the reporting period in which they occur.

Financial Risk Management

The Association's financial instruments consist primarily of deposits with banks, including short term investments, and accounts receivable and payable. The Association does not have any derivative instruments at 31.03.2026.

Association Details

The principal place of business of the Association is Helensburgh-Stanwell Park Surf Club premises, 1 Beach Road, Stanwell Park, NSW 2508

Going concern

The Association recorded a deficit of \$1,821 this financial year. Cash flow is positive with \$65,292 held at the end of the reporting period, and a further \$159,686 invested in Term Deposits of which \$100,000 is allocated to the Building Improvements Fund.

The Asset Renewal program supported by local businesses and Government grants, ensures our lifesaving and member development assets are renewed on a regular basis, whilst the Club's strategy of linking member subscriptions to utilities, insurances, building management and other general expenses associated with operating as an incorporated association, provides an on-going income source.

The Executive Committee through development and monitoring of cash flows and budgets, is confident that the Association can continue to meet its obligations to pay accounts as and when they fall due.

The current project to upgrade the Club premises is not intended to affect the operating income and will only proceed after the Association has secured funding from other sources.

Changes in operations and activities

The Executive Committee is unaware of any significant changes to its operations and other activities that may impact the Association's ability to continue as a going concern
